In addition to our programming, meet us for coffee every second Monday of the month during the academic year to submit work for publication in community.



His writing has appeared in LitHub, New England Review, Prairie Schooner, Poetry, and elsewhere. He is a former Wallace Stegner fellow at Stanford University and has received a creative writing grant from the Elizabeth George Foundation. He is the 2023–2024 Olive B. 




# The Michael Kuperman Memorial Poetry Library Presents The First Annual Lecture on Poetics with

ABOUT

Emily Griffiths Jones' research and teaching specializes in the literature of early modern England, with emphasis on Milton, Shakespeare, and women writers. Her first book, Right Romance: Heroic Subjectivity and Elect Community in Seventeenth–Century England, deals with intersections between genre, religion, and politics. Throughout her scholarship, Dr. Jones traces a vibrant literary tradition for anti–royalist writing in the period surrounding the English Civil War, and she explores early modern readers' and writers' passionate, playful, and queer emotional investments in texts. Her next book project is on "Early Modern Fandom": the rise of affective attachment to and identification with literature in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries.



Writer, professor, and photographer, Ocean Vuong is the author of On Earth We're Briefly Gorgeous, winner of the American Book Award, The Mark Twain Award, and The New England Book Award. The novel debuted for six weeks on The New York Times bestseller list and has since sold more than a million copies in 40 languages. A nominee for the National Book Award and a recipient of a MacArthur "Genius" Grant, he is also the author of the poetry collections, Time is a Mother, a finalist for the Griffin prize, and Night Sky with Exit Wounds, a New York Times Top 10 Book, winner of the T.S. Eliot Prize, the Whiting Award, the Thom Gunn Award. A Ruth Lilly fellow from the Poetry Foundation, his honors include fellowships from the Lannan Foundation, the Civitella Ranieri Foundation, The Elizabeth George Foundation, and The Academy of American Poets.





Her first book, In the Surgical Theatre, was chosen by Louise Glück for the 1999 American Poetry Review/Honickman First Book Prize and went on to receive numerous honors, including the 2003 PEN/Osterweil Award. A teacher of poetry for over thirty years, Levin has taught for the MFA Program for Writers at Warren Wilson College since 2002 and currently serves as Distinguished Writer in Residence at Maryville University in St. Louis.
