Before we are off for the summer, I would like to reiterate the key role that ISLAC plays in USF and the Tampa Bay Area. ISLAC has had a long-time presence in the area and through research, teaching and service aims at improving the understanding of Latin America, the Caribbean and Latinos in the US. This certainly enhances our contribution to both, the Tampa Bay Area and the State of Florida.

I would like to share that last month, I participated in a conference in San Cristobal de Las Casas, Chiapas (Mexico). It was a transformative experience where knowledge and expertise was shared by peoples from different local or indigenous communities, mainly women. New methodologies to building strong communities and collaborative practices were presented and put to work, with amazing results. I also learned a lot about the diversity and inclusion that can be practice from the bottom up, and how different indigenous groups are working with each other. Upon my return, I shared with my students in my Racial and Ethnic Relations class, more details about the different understanding of ethnicities and race that some of these communities have. Some of the pictures I took are in the front page!

I want to share some of my ideas for next year. **ISLAC** expects to be a pivotal player in the long road ahead, if USF moves forward to becoming a Hispanic Serving Institution. In the meantime, ISLAC has been actively engaged in ALAS, the presidential Task Force "Advancing Latino Access & Success" that president Law has created and in involved in the Status of Latinos (SoL).

ISLAC supports Latino/a/x students to be successful, thus next Fall will launch a pilot program, partnering students and faculty members. 


Guest Speakers

"Tweet me to Prison: Protest, Social Media, Free Speech and Autocracy Today"

with David E. Hoffman



Hoffman's presentation began with a story about a girl named Danuta Peredyna from Belarus. She was arrested for reposting a text on Telegram that criticized Putin and Lukashenko for the current war in Ukraine.



making After this repost, Peredyna Danuta later was up by picked police and arrested. She was sentenced to 6.5 years in prison. With this story, David Hoffman students, faculties and visitors shocked alike bv manipulation and abuses freedom of speech conducted by the Belarus government. Following the story, Hoffman asked the audience, "Could you imagine this happening to you?" Hoffman reminds us all that there are political prisoners around the world, people, almost entirely criminals, who are held captive for just demanding their rights.


The event had a wonderful turnout and it was a pleasure to share the experience of Carnaval's from different countries with the University of South Florida students, professors, and community supporters.


"Migration, Health, and Inequalities: Critical Activist Research Across Ecuadorean Borders" featuring Dr. Roberta Villalón

The University of South Florida had the opportunity of hosting Dr. Roberta Villalón on Tampa's USF campus to discuss her new book, "Migration, Health, and Inequalities: Critical Activist Research across Ecuadorean Borders". Dr. Roberta Villalón is a Fulbright Scholar, Professor and Chairperson of the Sociology and Anthropology Department at St. John's University in New York City. Students and faculty had the opportunity to ask questions following the presentation.

This interdisciplinary and transnational study looked at the health and well-being of Ecuadorians in relation with migration in the United States, Spain, and Ecuador. Dr. Villalón examine how social inequalities, migration, and health policies in the sending and receiving countries impact the experience of migrants. This book will be helpful in creating policy that improves the health and well-being of those associated with migration and lead to improved equality and social justice for migrants.






Presentation of Tamara Nemirovsky's Documentary
"Second Chances"





This documentary shares the story of four employees of The Portico Cafe, which supports people transitioning out of homelessness, addiction, and incarceration, providing them with opportunities for job training and employment. The unexpected pandemic changed COVID-19 Nemirovsky's original vision for the film, but in the end she was able to show the impact it had on those who are marginalized in society.



After the screening, there was a discussion with the Director and a participant from the documentary who answered questions from the audience.
