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News from the Director

Dear ISLAC family and friends,

USF 2023 Hispanic Heritage Month was full of events, awards and recognitions. ISLAC has been actively involved in organizing academic and community events, and, our students' and mission have been acknowledged in multiple occasions, making us proud.

ISLAC participated in the USF Hispanic Heritage Month Celebratory Luncheon, September 14, 2023, where I shared my experience as a Latina Faculty. During this luncheon, conversations among Latino/a/x Graduate Students and me sparked the creation of a new USF graduate student organization, named "Latina/e/o/x Graduate Student Organization". I am so excited to announce that I am their Faculty Mentor. We are already working together and have partnered with the USF Latino Scholarship Program to organize a mentoring event that showcases two exceptional Latinas: Betilde Muñoz-Poggosian and Marynes Mateos, both Venezuelan-Americans and USF alumni. This year, the Status of Latinos (SoL) Breakfast Award was held in USF - Saint Petersburg campus for the first time. USF President Rhea Law, USF Provost Prasant Mohapantra and the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences Magali Michael attended the ceremony. Barbara Herrera (ISLAC/MALACS) received a SoL Graduate Student Award, congratulations Barbara. I am honored to have also received a SoL award due to my involvement in ALAS. After two years of hard work, the Advancing Latino Access & Success Presidential Task Force (ALAS), submitted a report to USF with strategies and tactics to help USF improve Hispanic/Latinx student enrollment and enhance opportunities for educational and career success, to achieve the federal designation of Hispanic-Serving Institution.

I want to warmly welcome Dr. Isabela Cabral Felix de Sousa, from the Oswaldo Cruz Foundation, Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, who arrived at USF last month. She is doing research about international students and programs and presented preliminary findings in the Comparative and International Education Society Regional Conference, in Monterey, California. At the same venue, I presented a paper entitled "Examining ethnic and racial identities in the University: Latin Americans, Afro-descendants and Latinos in the US and Spain". This topic has been getting attention lately, thus together with Glenda Vaillant Cruz (USF student) and Dr Antonia Olmos Alcaraz (U of Granada, Spain), our worked got published in Education Sciences.

As announced, the Spring of 2024, in anticipation of the celebration of ISLAC 30th Anniversary, we are planning the first ISLAC Global Symposium. This event will highlight ISLAC Faculty and Students' research on Latin American, Caribbean and Latino issues. In this issue, we are launching the call for papers. I hope you send us your contribution (see call for papers below).

Several Latin American historical moments are remembered in September and October of 2023: 50 years of the military coup d'état that overthrew democracy in Chile, and 40 years of uninterrupted democracy in Argentina.



The Latinization of Indigenous Students: Erasing Identity and Restricting Opportunity at School



On September 27th, Dr. Rebecca Campbell-Montalvo, a USF Anthropology Ph.D. graduate, returned to the university to discuss her research conducted in rural Florida. Her latest book delves into the perception of indigenous youth by various schools. She argues that schools often manipulate the languages and racial identities of Indigenous Latinx students and families, erasing their indigeneity. Campbell-Montalvo also focused on the Migrant Education Program, which she believes can promote equitable access by encouraging teaching methods that position educators as either cultural insiders or learners. Following the book presentation, students and faculty engaged in a Q&A session. We are grateful that Dr. Rebecca Campbell-Montalvo returned to USF to share this valuable research with us!


Book Presentation by Dr. Luis Martínez-Fernández.

Dr. Luis Martinez-Fernandez is a Pegasus Professor of History at the University of Central Florida (UCF). He is an educator and columnist, specializing in Cuban and Caribbean history and culture, education, and global contemporary history and also a syndicated columnist with Creators Syndicate.

Dr. Martínez-Fernández came to USF to speak about his new book, a collection of 66 essays and opinion columns written at the intersection of history, chronicling, and opinion journalism, each offering a dialogue between the past and present.

The event began with introductions by Dr. Beatriz Padilla, the Director of The Institute for the Study of Latin America and the Caribbean (ISLAC) and comments by **Dr. Alejandro Marquez,** Assistant Professor of Sociology.

In his presentation, Dr. Martínez-Fernández shared how his personal life experiences and beliefs influenced his writing process. He also discussed how pivotal recent historical events found expression in the book. Regarding Latin America and the Caribbean, Dr. Martinez Fernandez addressed the political and social significance of cases such as Puerto Rico, Barbados, Cuba, and Haiti.



In Costa Rica, Julissa views herself as just a "Tica", but in the United States, she embraces her Latin American identity.



Dr. Beatriz Padilla has been involved in the ALAS Task Force (Advancing Latino Access and Success) for two years.


In September, ALAS presented a report to USF President Rhea Law. Dr Law was impressed with their work, and appreciated their suggestions and recommendations.

"Multicultural Diversity in the Spanish Public University: An Ethnographic Case Study of Latin American, Latino, and Afro-Latin American Students"





Tracing the flows of people, material items, and digital content between Havana and Miami, as well as between Cuba and Panama, Guyana, and Mexico, Circulating Culture explores how and why these circuits are a part of everyday life for millions of Cubans who negotiate extraordinary circumstances daily. Drawing on extensive ethnographic research in these locations, Jennifer Cearns highlights what Cuban culture and identity mean in a transnational setting. Ultimately, by focusing on everyday objects and the strategies used to move them across borders, this book reveals how new cultural forms can develop from the cracks in societies often seen as "broken."


