

Fraud Awareness: How to Take Action

Fraud is a pervasive issue that impacts many organizations, including USF. According to the Association of Certified Fraud Examiners, it is estimated that organizations lose 5% of revenue to fraud each year, which is more than \$5 trillion globally! As a USF employee, you play a crucial role in recognizing and reporting potential fraud. In fact, more frauds are uncovered through tips than through any other method.

The Q&As below contain additional information about reporting suspected fraud.

What is fraud?

- Fraud is the intentional use of deception for personal gain or to harm others, often achieved by misrepresenting facts or concealing information.

Will my report be anonymous?

- You can report anonymously through [EthicsPoint](#), a third party. The Office of Internal Audit can communicate with anonymous reporters via EthicsPoint.

Am I required to report suspected fraud?

- Per [USF Regulation 5.001](#), USF employees are required to immediately report suspected or observed wasteful, fraudulent, or dishonest acts.

Does USF take action against employees who commit fraud?

- USF has zero tolerance for unethical or fraudulent activity and will take disciplinary action up to and including dismissal and civil and criminal prosecution.

What if I'm concerned about retaliation for reporting fraud?

- [USF Policy 0-020](#) prohibits retaliation against employees who report in good faith.

Should I investigate suspected fraud myself before I report it?


- To protect evidence and avoid legal issues, do not attempt to investigate fraud before reporting.
